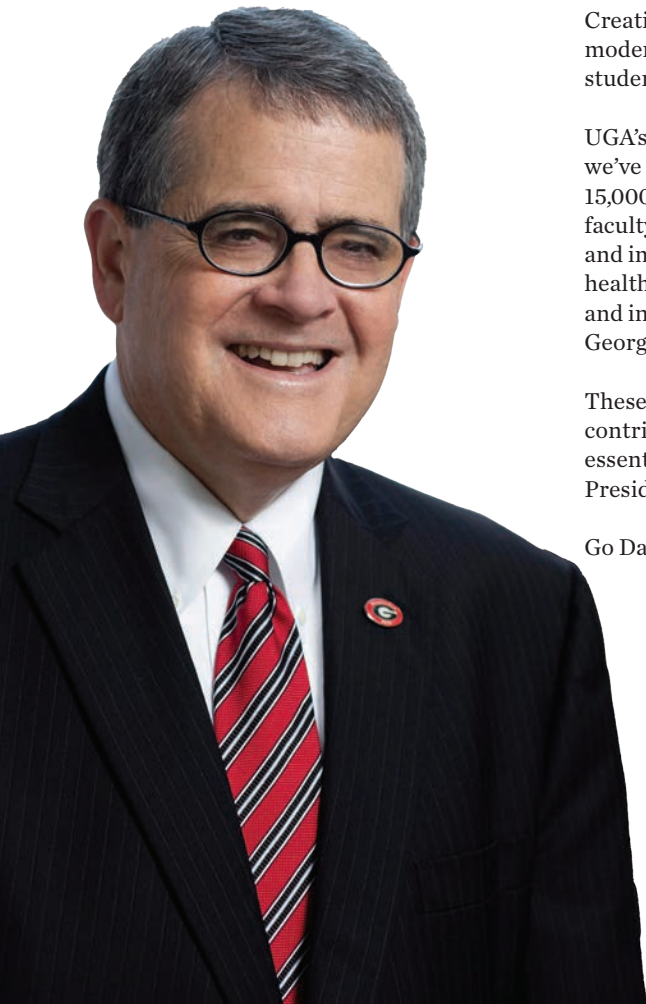

This past year at the University of Georgia has been one marked by extraordinary growth, impactful achievements, and a steadfast commitment to excellence. Thanks to the unwavering support of our talented students, distinguished faculty, dedicated staff, and passionate alumni and friends, UGA continues to ascend to new heights in teaching, research, and service.

Our research enterprise reached unprecedented milestones, with a record-breaking \$628 million in annual expenditures. Our talented faculty and students pursued groundbreaking discoveries, including developing innovative technologies to remove harmful chemicals from drinking water and new, unique ways to treat traumatic brain injury. Notably, we welcomed four new Georgia Research Alliance Eminent Scholars, whose interdisciplinary work embodies our mission to accelerate scientific breakthroughs across a number of fields.

Academically, our students continue to thrive in the classroom and across the globe. We are proud to be one of only nine public universities in the nation with a six-year graduation rate of 90% or higher, a reflection of our comprehensive student support programs and mentorship initiatives. We also celebrated reaching a transformative milestone by endowing our 1,000th need-based scholarship, making higher education accessible to even more students. Our ongoing commitment to active learning and experiential education positions our graduates for success in their careers and lives.

At the same time, we are expanding our academic offerings to meet the needs of our state and the world. The new UGA School of Medicine has progressed with the support of public and private partners, including \$100 million in a combination of state funding and private commitments for our new medical education and research facility. This landmark initiative promises to expand Georgia’s healthcare landscape and is projected to generate up to \$2.3 billion in economic benefits by 2040. Additionally, campus improvements such as the new Creative Engagement Wing at the Miller Learning Center and the extensive renovations to modernize research and instruction facilities on UGA’s Science and Ag Hill further empower students and faculty to innovate and excel.

UGA’s impact is felt far beyond Athens. Through the Small Business Development Center, we’ve helped launch over 2,000 businesses and supported the creation of more than 15,000 jobs in just five years. Our Archway Partnership continues to connect students and faculty with communities to address local needs, including revitalizing downtown areas and improving healthcare access in rural regions. At the CARE Center, faculty and public health experts are transforming dementia care in Georgia through education, outreach, and innovative technology, especially in underserved areas. This is what it means to serve Georgia, and we remain steadfast in our commitment to doing just that.

These advances are only possible because of you, our generous supporters. Your contributions fuel our shared vision for a vibrant, impactful UGA. Thank you for being an essential part of this journey. It is with immense pride and gratitude that I present the 2025 President’s Annual Report. Truly, it has never been a better time to be a Georgia Bulldog.

LETTER FROM THE **FOUNDATION CHAIR**

I’m writing to you all today having just concluded my term as chair of the University of Georgia Foundation. It has been my honor to witness the remarkable accomplishments that we have achieved together over the last year, including a record-breaking fundraising year surpassing more than \$300.4 million.

We also reached a record three-year fundraising rolling average of \$272.8 million and raised support from over 72,000 unique donors to benefit important initiatives across campus. Thanks to this generous donor support, we successfully funded the new Medical Education and Research Building, which will significantly expand teaching and research capabilities at UGA’s School of Medicine. Our fundraising focus for the School of Medicine has now shifted to student scholarships to attract the best and brightest future physicians and healthcare workers in our state.

In November, we celebrated establishing more than 1,000 need-based scholarship endowments, and that number continues to rise. With the UGA Foundation managing over \$2 billion in assets, our Board of Trustees is proud to assist the Foundation in stewarding those assets and returning them to the highest priority areas for the university. In FY25, \$32.5 million was allocated to support more than 9,500 students through need-based aid, experiential learning opportunities, and upgrades to facilities.

UGA parents, alumni, and friends continue to invest in student success, with the Parents Leadership Council raising a record \$1.5 million for student programs, including \$100,000 to benefit School of Medicine scholarships. The Young Alumni Leadership Council also launched the Finish the Drill Scholarship Fund, a need-based scholarship for students facing financial challenges in their final year at UGA. On Dawg Day of Giving this spring, the Bulldog Nation rallied together to raise more than \$5.5 million—setting a record for the number of donors! Donors, alumni, students, and friends of the University contributed more than 13,000 gifts, marking the fourth consecutive year that we have set a single-day giving record.

It is incredible to witness the collective impact we can make on our students, faculty, staff, and the entire UGA community. I am grateful for the opportunity to have served as chair of the UGA Foundation and to see the many ways this University continues to grow. Thank you to our donors, alumni, and friends for the important role you play in supporting this institution and elevating UGA to new heights.

Jack Huang has made a powerful mark on both the University's research enterprise and global health.

His breakthrough technology, DE-FLUORO, removes PFAS (forever chemicals) from drinking water, eliminating one of the most persistent and dangerous human-made pollutants of this century.

During his tenure at UGA, Dr. Huang has submitted 13 invention disclosures, including four issued U.S. patents, two issued Australian patents, and multiple pending patent applications, which led to his recognition as 2024 UGA Inventor of the Year. These products lead to more than research papers. Dr. Huang focuses on challenging environmental issues like cleanup of persistent pollutants and soil health enhancement. He is committed to providing solutions for problems that affect people's health and quality of life.

This spirit of innovation runs deep across campus, with more than 1,200 products brought to market through UGA research since the 1970s. Last year alone, industry partners launched 66 new products from our labs into the world.

OUR RESEARCHERS DON'T STOP AT SOLVING
ONE PROBLEM. THEY ASK, **WHAT'S NEXT?**

“Environmental issues have a serious impact on everyone's lives. When we bring products to market, we solve real problems for real people. Knowing that my research can make a difference drives me to work even harder.”

BREAKTHROUGHS IN BIOSCIENCE

Inside UGA's Regenerative Bioscience Center, researchers Steven Stice, Jarrod Call, and Franklin West are confronting a bold question: Can the brain heal itself after injury?

With a \$3.7 million grant from the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, they're exploring how stem cells might treat traumatic brain injury—a discovery that could help reduce the tens of thousands of TBI-related deaths in the U.S. each year.

Just a short walk away at the Biointerface Translation and Engineering Center, Hitesh Handa is designing medical devices that do more than function—they fight back. With \$12 million in federal support and over 35 patent filings, his team is tackling some of the toughest

medical challenges—infections, thrombosis, and antimicrobial resistance.

Meanwhile, a major leap is happening in the world of glycoscience—the study of biological sugar molecules with applications in medicine, energy, and new materials. With an \$18 million National Science Foundation grant, Lance Wells is building the BioFoundry at UGA's Complex Carbohydrate Research Center—a cutting-edge initiative designed to engineer biofuels and plant-based materials with the power of sugars.

Each breakthrough is part of a larger story: the rise of UGA as a powerhouse of discovery. And none of it happens without one essential ingredient—people.

At the forefront of UGA's School of Medicine, Dr. Yana Zavros is building a research center from the ground up. Her focus on pancreatic cancer and Cushing's disease is setting the stage for efficient, more specialized medical studies.

Dr. Zavros uses lab-grown organ models called organoids to study how immune systems respond to tumor cells. Data has already resulted in the identification of a targeted therapy for pancreatic cancer which is undergoing a Phase 2 clinical trial. She also uses organoids to study treatment for Cushing's disease. This research led to a multi-disciplinary, NIH-funded initiative which is reshaping diagnostics across human and veterinary medicine.

With her focus on real-world solutions, Dr. Zavros represents the future of UGA: bold, effective, interdisciplinary science with global impact.

“It's important that every question that we're asking has clinical relevance. We must have an interdisciplinary team of translational scientists, oncologists, pathologists, surgeons, clinicians, and veterinarians. That's what it takes to accelerate the movement of scientific discovery to the clinic.”

PILOTING ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The Faculty Innovation Fellows pilot program uses faculty ambassadors to help amplify the Innovation District's mission, develop new ideas, and grow our talent pipeline.

This initiative equips our brightest faculty, entrepreneurs, and researchers to move their work through the industry pipeline—from concept to

commercialization. Faculty Innovation Fellows connect researchers with industry partners and innovative programs, giving them a direct line to emerging technology.

A two-year pilot program through UGA's Innovation District tapped five fellows in the first year and will double by year two.

As part of the Innovation District's initiative to foster collaboration, the Delta Innovation Hub hosts regular events from student competitions to workshops and networking sessions for entrepreneurs.

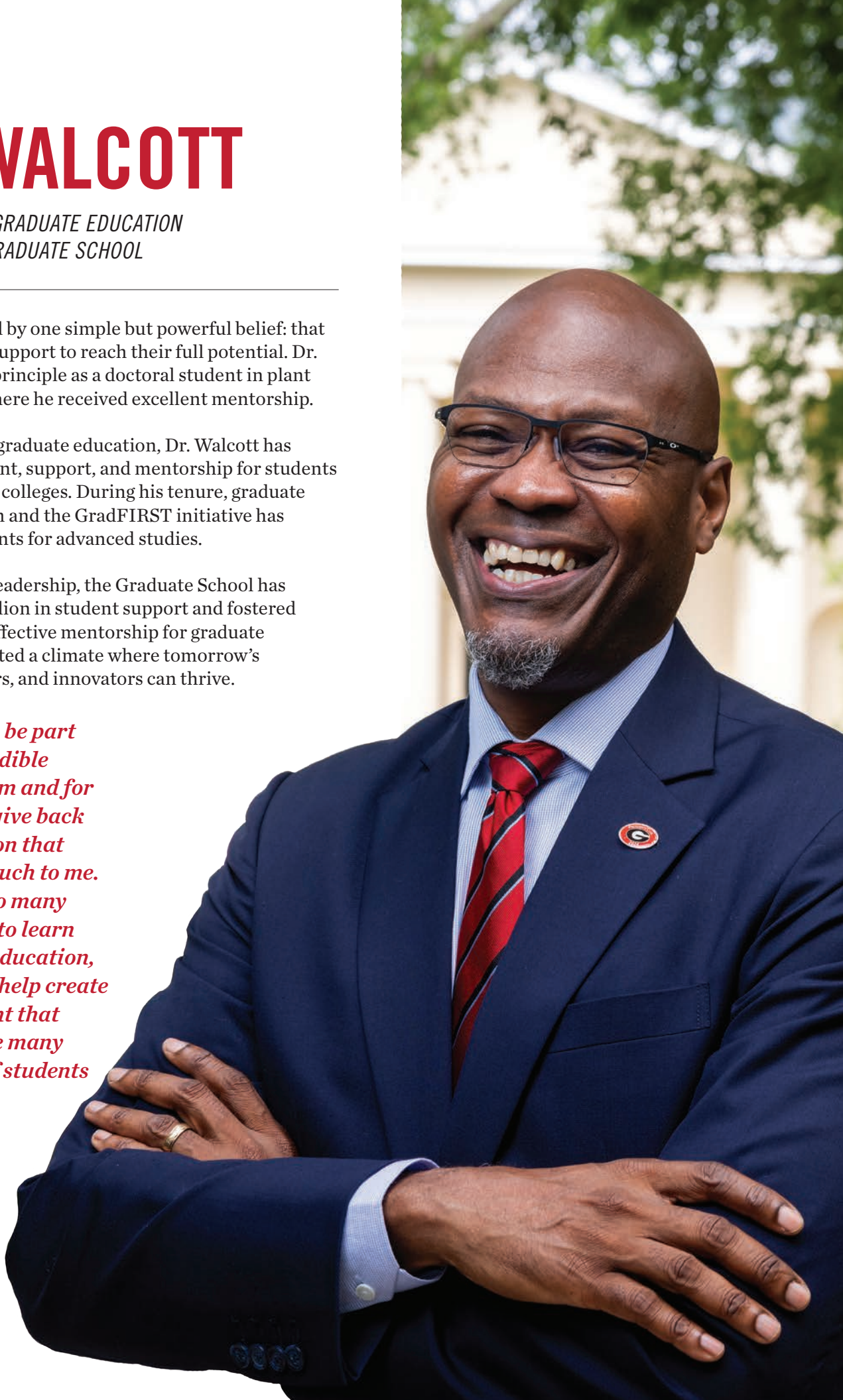

Now UGA’s leader in graduate education, Dr. Walcott has focused on recruitment, support, and mentorship for students across 19 schools and colleges. During his tenure, graduate enrollment has grown and the GradFIRST initiative has helped prepare students for advanced studies.

Under Dr. Walcott’s leadership, the Graduate School has secured nearly \$1 million in student support and fostered programs to enable effective mentorship for graduate students. He has created a climate where tomorrow’s researchers, educators, and innovators can thrive.

ACTIVE LEARNING

Active learning is education that moves the needle. What started as lectures is now:

- Capstone projects that pair students with real business clients;
- United Nations Security Council simulations;
- Interactive AI technology where students use problem-solving techniques to uncover fraud; and
- Moot court practice where students learn to analyze legal issues in real time.

UGA’s Active Learning Initiative trains educators to push the boundaries of undergraduate instruction. This initiative has enhanced the learning experience for more than 78,000 students since 2018.

That momentum reached new heights in 2025, as UGA’s third annual Active Learning Summit drew several hundred attendees from across the country to share ideas, sharpen strategies, and foster collaboration.

PEER LEARNING ASSISTANTS

The power of peer support is immeasurable. UGA's Peer Learning Assistant initiative puts students who've excelled in their academic journeys in the role of leader, educator, and mentor. Students who were standouts in a course can return to help their peers with classroom learning, test preparation, and homework.

Since 2018, this program offered by the Office for Student Success and Achievement has significantly improved student comprehension in courses. The program was broadened this year to expand the number of courses with peer learning assistants available, with more than 200 peers in over 80 courses boosting student achievement.

SUPPORTING STUDENT GROWTH

From students' first day on campus, the Comprehensive Learner Record at UGA helps them map how every course, activity, and experience adds up to their career preparedness. This dynamic, visual tool helps tell their stories better than any resume and highlights their readiness for the world.

As they prepare to lead in their careers, we help our students stay on course in the classroom. UGA's Connect & Complete Persistence Framework proactively supports undergraduate students facing academic challenges by removing institutional roadblocks and offering personalized guidance. Our commitment to student success gives students confidence to establish their vision for their academic journey and beyond.

As a Boren Scholar and one of 54 U.S. undergraduates selected as a 2025 Truman Scholar, Mercedes plans to continue her work with a master's in Russian studies. Mercedes will spend her capstone year studying Russian and conducting research in Kazakhstan as a student in the Russian Flagship Program.

Inspired by stories of service passed down from her father and grandfather, Mercedes has not strayed from her goals since she first put on her uniform. She was a cadet in UGA's Air Force ROTC and will begin a career as an intelligence officer in the U.S. Air Force. She hopes her military and academic career will lead to roles in U.S. diplomatic efforts abroad.

MEDICAL EDUCATION AND RESEARCH BUILDING

In one year, we have made significant progress in turning a vision of the UGA School of Medicine into a reality.

We have hired top-tier faculty and administrators and have national searches underway for researchers, secured \$50 million in private funds to match the \$50 million in state support, and broke ground on a cutting-edge 92,000-square-foot education and research facility.

This is only the beginning. The School of Medicine is poised to transform Georgia's health care landscape with improved patient outcomes, research breakthroughs, and job creation.

With every hire, every brick put in place, and every dollar raised for student scholarships, UGA reshapes the future of medicine in Georgia and beyond.

The School of Medicine's state-of-the-art facility will feature medical simulation suites, biomedical laboratories, and classrooms to support Georgia's growing health care needs.

GROWING RESEARCH SPACE

As we continue to invest in research space to enhance our campus, the Science and Ag Hill Modernization Phase 1 renovation of Cedar Street Building C transformed more than 100,000 square feet of laboratories and support spaces.

Open laboratories, microscopy rooms, insect containment facilities, walk-in environmental chambers, and plant growth spaces bring this renewed state-of-the-art facility to life.

This project continues UGA's work to modernize labs across Science and Ag Hill and boosts groundbreaking research in infectious diseases, plant sciences, behavioral research, animal health, and informatics.

FOSTERING CREATIVITY

In 2024, the Franklin College of Arts and Sciences celebrated the naming of the Jill and Marvin Willis Center for Writing. The center champions writing across disciplines, empowering students to become effective communicators in any field.

The newly funded Creative Engagement Wing at the Miller Learning Center provides equipment and services in design and fabrication, media production, and virtual reality—giving students the hands-on experience they need to turn their visions of the future into careers.

In 2024, the Terry Family Foundation committed \$2 million to support the School of Medicine. They also created a \$15 million endowment to support and name the Risk Management and Insurance Program at the Terry College of Business for C. Herman Terry. Thanks to the Terry Foundation's support, the program will expand its offerings as the largest U.S. undergraduate program of its kind, with more resources for faculty research and experiential learning opportunities for students.

Foundation President Betsy Cox reflects a similar spirit in her involvement and personal contributions. She has supported multiple campus initiatives, including as a founding member of Georgia Women Give and in creating an endowed scholarship at the School of Law. She has also documented a gift in her estate plan. She is currently serving as a Trustee of the UGA Foundation and a member of the Board of Visitors at UGA Law.

“The Terry Family Foundation’s commitment to UGA’s pursuit of academic excellence and innovation is rooted in the legacy of our esteemed founders, Herman and Mary Virginia Terry. Their vision was to empower students to achieve their highest potential. We are thrilled to continue supporting the University we all love.”

UPGRADING CAMPUS SECURITY

Campus safety continues to be our top priority. We have invested more than \$25 million over the last nine years in new safety and security initiatives.

The latest upgrades expanded security camera coverage across campus and more than tripled the number of emergency call stations. UGA also installed additional

security fencing and increased resources for the UGA Police Department’s 911 Communications Center.

These investments add to UGA’s considerable security measures already in place, including the RideShare program, campus safety ambassadors, and the full-service, 24/7 police department.



THE LEGACY OF HOLMES AND HUNTER

Even as we venture into the future, the University continues to build upon our history. In fall 2024, we celebrated the completed renovations of the Holmes-Hunter Academic Building on UGA’s historic North Campus.

Renamed for Hamilton Holmes and Charlayne Hunter-Gault, the first African American students to attend UGA, the building now features restored architectural details, improved accessibility, enhanced functionality,

and a courtyard that pays tribute to the building’s namesakes.

The \$30 million transformation was supported by a \$15 million gift from the Robert W. Woodruff Foundation, which accelerated the project by several years. The project also received support from Georgia Power Company and Regions Bank, in addition to institutional funding.

UGA's Small Business Development Center has created opportunities across the state, leading to more than 15,000 jobs, 2,000 businesses, and \$9.5B in sales in five years. And our Community Defense Resilience Program connects the cities and towns near U.S. military bases with UGA experts who help boost their economies, support families, and leverage natural resources.

This is impact in action. Together, we are changing lives in Georgia.

Jenay Beer turns research into real-world impact. An associate professor at UGA's Institute of Gerontology in the College of Public Health, Dr. Beer is co-director of the Cognitive Aging Research and Education (CARE) Center with Lisa Renzi-Hammond, where they lead statewide efforts to support individuals with dementia and their caregivers.

Since joining UGA in 2017, Dr. Beer has focused on the intersection of aging, technology, and public health—especially in rural areas with limited access to care. Recognizing Georgia's unique challenges, she helped launch the CARE Center as a hub for dementia education, research, and community support.

Under her and Dr. Renzi-Hammond's leadership, the center has brought listening sessions, clinics, and support groups to underserved counties. They collaborate with public health experts, UGA Cooperative Extension agents, and Archway Partnership teams to share knowledge and support. The CARE Center operates in over a dozen counties, and Dr. Beer serves as the center's point person in McDuffie and Washington counties, helping connect local needs with university resources.

Through community education, provider training, and the use of digital tools, Dr. Beer is breaking down barriers to care and transforming how dementia is understood and treated in Georgia.

ARCHWAY PARTNERSHIP

The Archway Partnership connects UGA's brightest minds with communities in Georgia to create lasting change. Since 2005, more than 2,000 students and 300 faculty members at UGA have rolled up their sleeves to tackle projects including:

- Supporting downtown revitalization through infrastructure and community branding in Pulaski County;
- Restoring historic buildings and developing green spaces in Fort Valley;
- Improving community healthcare options in Washington County; and
- Designing a new downtown community park in Thomson.

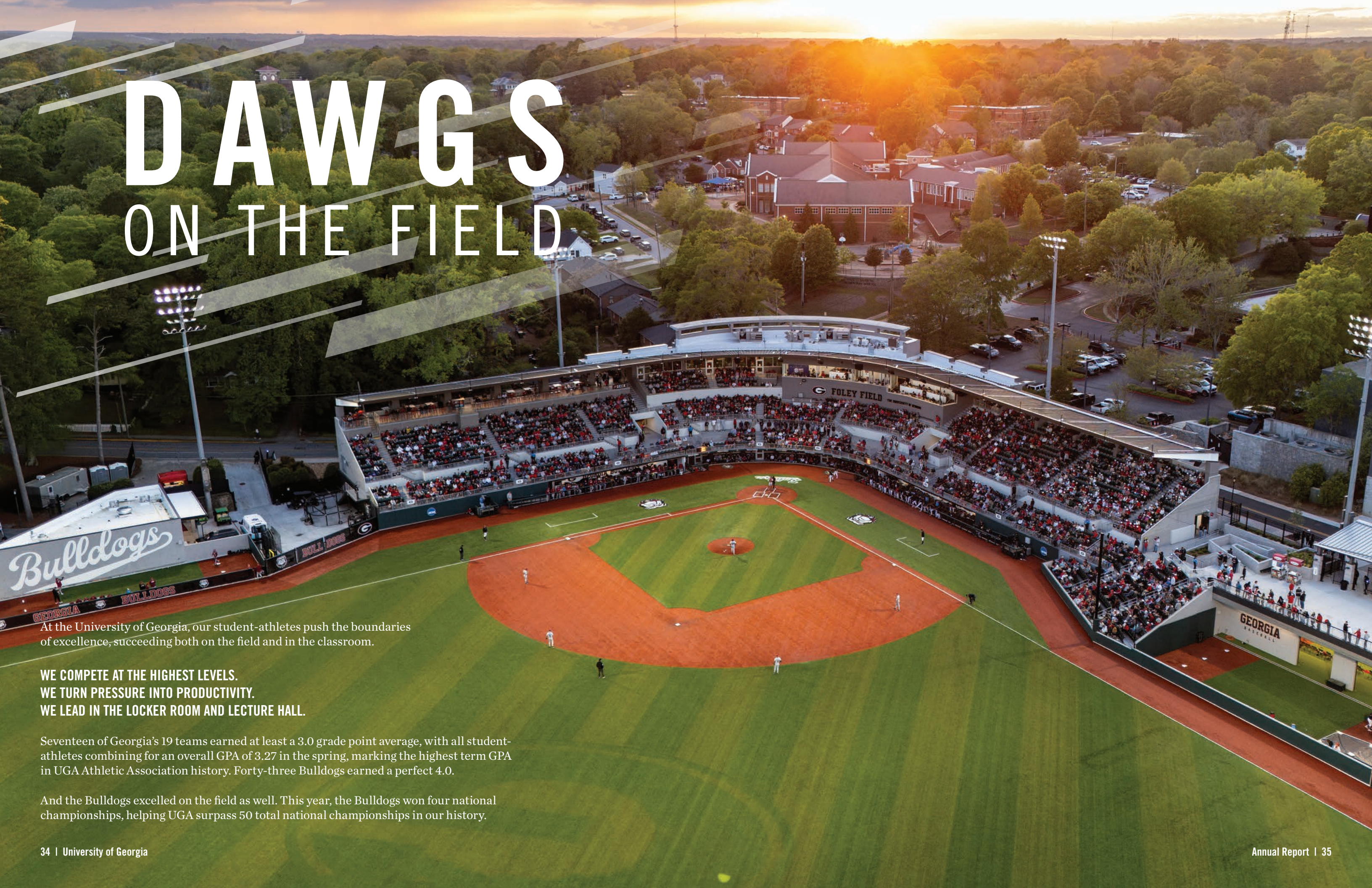


RURAL ENGAGEMENT

The program Look Ahead Georgia is a summer internship and career development program that provides students with hands-on career experience while building a pipeline of skilled workers ready to fuel rural economies. Students do everything from setting up Wi-Fi systems, developing quality control documentation, and shadowing surgeons. The program has expanded from its initial offering in

Pulaski County to Laurens County, and it will be in six counties next year.

Academic faculty connect with communities to tackle challenges through the University's Rural Engagement Workshop. The University Economic Development Association recognized this program with the 2024 Award of Excellence.



DAWGS ON THE FIELD

At the University of Georgia, our student-athletes push the boundaries of excellence, succeeding both on the field and in the classroom.

Seventeen of Georgia's 19 teams earned at least a 3.0 grade point average, with all student-athletes combining for an overall GPA of 3.27 in the spring, marking the highest term GPA in UGA Athletic Association history. Forty-three Bulldogs earned a perfect 4.0.

And the Bulldogs excelled on the field as well. This year, the Bulldogs won four national championships, helping UGA surpass 50 total national championships in our history.

An NCAA Champion in the 1650-yard freestyle and captain of Georgia's women's swim team, Abby McCulloh excels no matter what the arena. As the 2025 SEC Women's Swimming & Diving Scholar-Athlete of the Year, she holds a perfect 4.0 GPA and was recognized as a First Honor Graduate. She also earned the prestigious Joel Eaves Scholar-Athlete Award and SEC Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete of the Year, which is only given to the top athletes in the SEC.

Abby's impact reaches far beyond the lanes—she serves on the UGA Athletic Association Board of Directors, sits on the Executive Board of the Palladia Women's Society, and is a proud member of the Blue Key National Honor Society.

With a commitment to both academic and athletic excellence, Abby is a true model of success at the University of Georgia.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Four Bulldog teams brought home national championships in 2025.

UGA's equestrian team earned its eighth National Collegiate Equestrian Association title at the World Equestrian Center. Head coach Meghan Boenig, who has been at UGA since the inception of the team, was inducted into the NCEA Hall of Fame the night before the Bulldogs won their title in April.

The women's tennis team won the ITA National Team Indoor Championship for the fifth time in school history (first since 2019), and its first NCAA team title in 15 years. Top-seeded Georgia avenged an NCAA

finals loss to Texas A&M last season, beating the Aggies this year 4-0.

Finally, the women's track and field team won its first national outdoor NCAA Championship in June. The Bulldog women last captured the indoor team championship in 2018.

The Bulldogs won nine additional individual national championships, including Dasha Vidamanova's women's tennis singles championship and Aaliyah Butler's 400m and her team's 4x400-meter relay record-breaking time at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships.



SEC CHAMPIONS

The 2024 SEC Football Championship delivered drama, history, and a Bulldog victory for the ages. In a heart-pounding overtime game, Georgia edged out Texas 22-19, claiming the program's 15th SEC title in the first championship game ever to go beyond regulation.

The win not only crowned the Bulldogs kings of the SEC but also sealed the 2024 senior class as the winningest in school history. With this victory, Georgia beat the Longhorns twice in a single season—a feat the program hadn't accomplished against any opponent since 1943.



FOUNDATION REPORT

The University of Georgia Foundation manages over \$2 billion in assets, \$1.8 billion of which is endowed. By monitoring economic conditions and forecasts and adjusting investment strategy accordingly, the Foundation ensures these assets generate reliable support for students, faculty, staff, and the work of the University.

The 47 members of the Foundation Board of Trustees lead and serve as ambassadors and advocates for the University. Trustees also direct support to top campus priorities using funds generated by Foundation assets and annually available to the board. In FY 2025, more than \$32.5 million in scholarship support was allocated to over 9,500 students.

Robin and Wayne Hoover are lifelong Bulldogs committed to giving back. For more than a decade, they have been generous advocates fighting against food insecurity on campus.

The Hoover family was instrumental in establishing the Let All the Big Dawgs Eat Food Scholarship initiative. Since its inception, the Hoovers have provided more than 135 meal plan scholarships and established two endowments to sustain these efforts for generations to come.

Outside of this initiative, the Hoovers serve as volunteers for boards across campus. Together, they continue to embody the spirit of UGA—leading with generosity, service, and an unwavering dedication to student success.

THE LEGACY OF DELTA HALL

The University of Georgia celebrated the 10th anniversary of Delta Hall, its residential learning facility in Washington, D.C., this spring. The facility has significantly enhanced experiential learning opportunities for students since its opening in 2015. Nearly 900 students have interned at over 200 organizations, including the White House, Delta Air Lines, and The UPS Foundation.

A \$5 million grant from The Delta Air Lines Foundation and contributions from more than 80 individual and corporate donors helped to secure and renovate the building while also establishing new internship and lecture opportunities for students. Delta Hall serves as a hub for UGA’s Washington Semester Program, offering students integrated living, coursework, and internships in the nation’s capital.



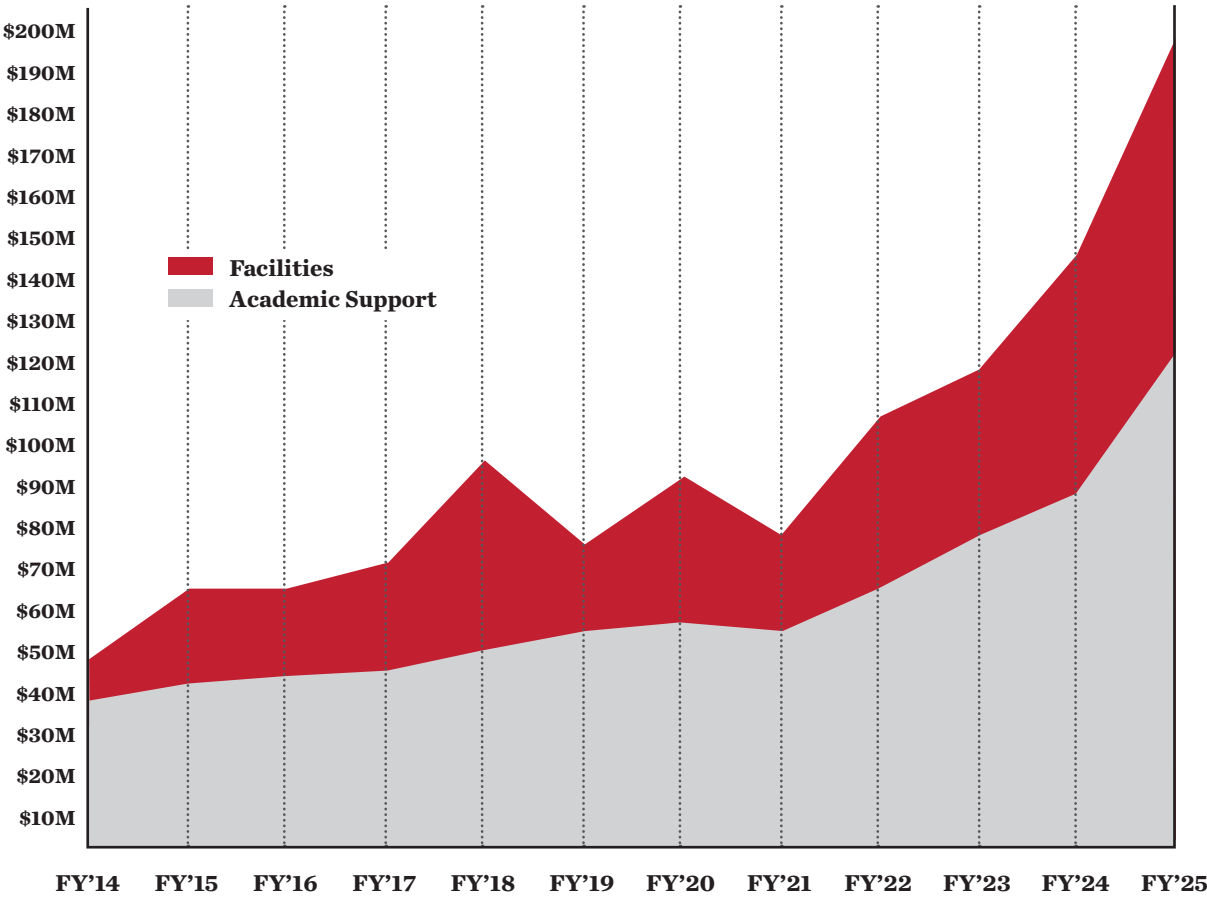

PARENTS LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

The University of Georgia Parents Leadership Council achieved a historic milestone by raising a record \$1.5 million in support of student programs for the 2025–26 academic year. Comprised of a dedicated group of highly-engaged parents, council membership includes an annual contribution of \$5,000 or more per family. These philanthropic gifts are allocated to a wide range

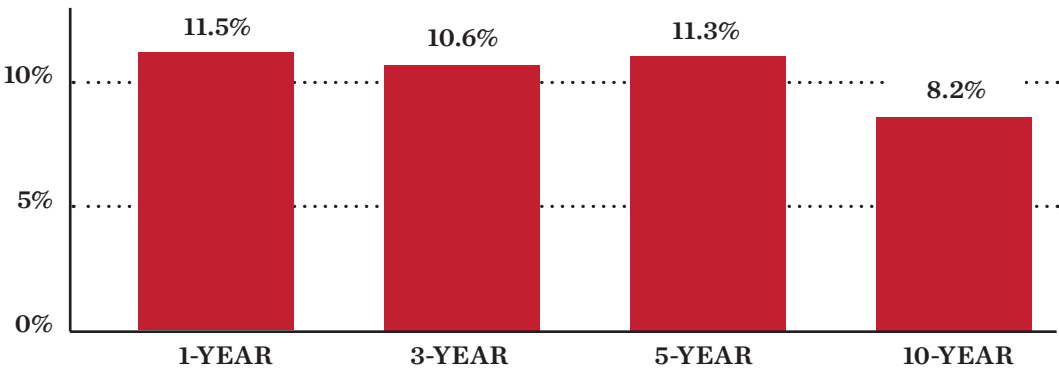

SENIOR SIGNATURE

The University of Georgia’s Class of 2025 set a record for the Senior Signature campaign, with over 3,400 graduating students contributing more than \$115,000 to the University. This initiative, a tradition since 1991, encourages students to leave a lasting legacy by donating to a chosen campus fund. Each donor directed \$20 of their \$30 gift to one of 544 designated funds,

such as the State Botanical Garden Excellence Fund and the Honors Fund of Excellence. The remaining \$10 from each donation provided a grant to the Spike Squad student group. The campaign’s success reflects the Class of 2025’s dedication to giving back and their desire to enhance the University experience for future students.

PROGRAM SUPPORT ON CAMPUS

Donor support helped UGA both launch and advance strategic academic programs this year. The Terry College of Business created the M. Douglas and V. Kay Ivester Institute for Business Analytics and Insights, thanks to a gift from the Ivesters. The institute incorporates advanced analytics into both undergraduate and graduate business education to train the next generation of experts in the field.

UGA also honored the impactful legacies of Ed Benson and Gary Bertsch by renaming the Center for International Trade and Security as the Benson-Bertsch Center for International Trade and Security, celebrating both leaders’ longstanding contributions to UGA. Meanwhile, the new Layton Design Studio at the Lamar Dodd School of Art underscores UGA’s commitment to innovation and student success, providing a dynamic space that nurtures creativity and design excellence.

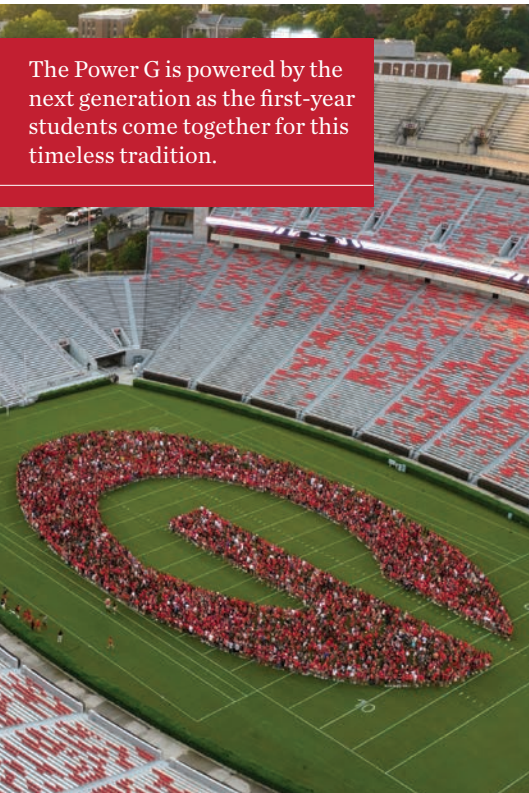
